



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Cut out along the heavy black line.


The art I do consists of gathering found objects, photographs, bits of scrap, everyday materials which are repeated and arranged in a box. – I.F.W.

under the eyes' caress – F.A.





Cut out the boat and padlock. Move them about on grid 3, travelling wherever your story takes them.








# G U Y P E L L E R I N
